## HOGAN—BELCHER

William Hogan was born in 1805 in Jackson County, Ga. His forebears were Irish or Scotch-Irish. It is thought that William was the oldest child of his parents and that his father was a ~~William~~ also. His parents lived probably within 150 miles of Hogansville. William married his first cousin, Mary Elizabeth Hogan, and by her had six children. Very likely Wm. and Mary Hogan were married when they moved to new land for their plantation home in 1828, which started the town of Hogansville, Ga. Their first home was a log house, but William soon built a frame house of lumber hauled in and consisting of six rooms in a two-story plan. In 1851, he tore down his house and made negro quarters of the lumber, while erecting a large, red brick Colonial home for his family. It had ten rooms, two chimneys at each end of the house, four huge white columns in front with a small upper porch in front between columns. It was of three stories, had a cedar tree lined driveway and well-kept gardens—the pride of the owner's heart. His house burned in the 1870's. Afterward a granddaughter, owner at the time, rebuilt the home but of frame construction, and not nearly so imposing in appearance.

William Hogan's brothers were John, Shadrack, and a half-brother, ~~Herold or Harold~~, who went to California in 1849 during the gold rush and remained there seven years. He returned to his family in Atlanta to move them to California, but only one daughter and his wife would go. The other

daughter had married a Dr. Ford; her name, Levina (Hogan) Ford. She had two daughters, Betty and Flutilla Ford, beautiful girls whom Rebecca Hogan Amis visited in 1868 at the time she went to purchase her trousseau before marrying John Thomas Amis. The Ford home was on Peachtree Road, Atlanta.

William Hogan's brother, John, married a remarkably beautiful woman and had one son, Dr. John (Jack) Hogan, who married Miss ~~Stripling~~ <sup>Strickland</sup> and had two children, a boy, John, and a girl, ~~Johnnie~~ <sup>Agnes</sup>. The daughter married and taught school in Athens, Ga. <sup>(music teacher)</sup>

All Hogans had brown or black eyes and dark brown hair with very white skin. Susan Belcher, second wife of Wm. Hogan, whom he married in 1836, when she was 18 years old, had black eyes and dark hair, but her brothers, Benjamin and Samuel Belcher, had light hair and blue eyes, were very blond.

After the death of Wm. Hogan, May 6, 1861, Susan Belcher Hogan married his brother, John Hogan. In later years she made her home with a son until her death in 1906 at the age of 88 years.

Nothing is known of William's brother, Shadrack (wife, Sally) except that his daughters were Sallie, mar., and ~~Martha Hogan, m. Perdue~~. <sup>no such daughter</sup>

William Hogan's sisters were Amanda and Jemima. Amanda married a Martin and Jemima married a Holland of Athens, Ga., it is thought.

Susan Belcher, born 1818, Burke County, Ga., was daughter of Abner Belcher and his first wife, Martha Field (or Fields) who lived about 150 miles from Hogansville. Abner Belcher was a Baptist preacher and planter.

Abner Belcher's wife, Martha (Fields) died and was buried in Mississippi, when Susannah was 6 years old. Her father soon returned to Georgia and married again. Susannah's brothers were: Benjamin, Samuel (both married) and Columbus, unmarried, who clerked in the Hogan stores. Her sisters were two, one named Lucinda.

Belcher family was from England and record with coat-of-arms given Media Research Co., Washington, D. C. A Canadian descendant of one branch, now in U. S., says: "There were three Belcher brothers; one settled in Massachusetts and received grant of land from English King in Novia Scotia, where my branch of family have resided; other two brothers came south, names unknown."

The mother of William Hogan's first wife, Mary Elizabeth Hogan, often visited Hogansville after her daughter's death to see her grandchildren. She is well remembered by Mrs. Rebecca Hogan Amis, as she traveled in a very fine carriage for the times with

a coachman and footman and fine stepping horses. She always brought with her a small and exquisitely dressed granddaughter, Frances' Hogan. The family had much wealth and she had given her daughter, Mary, many slaves.

William Hogan expanded the plantation's commissary into a general store and gradually this into a group of stores of all kinds, becoming the village of Hogansville. He worked valiantly at securing a Post Office and later a railroad for the town. He made brick from the red clay and all buildings erected were of red brick from his brickyard.

A few miles from Hogansville a school was established for the benefit of the children of neighboring plantation owners. It was called Smithfield Academy and William Hogan was its leading organizer, trustee, and patron. It flourished with good teachers until the beginning of the War Between the States, when it was impossible to secure male teachers. One by one the daughters of William Hogan were sent to La Grange to a Female Seminary.

*doubtful* In time, William Hogan became an extensive importer of sugar, tea, and coffee from foreign ports. Once a year he went to New York markets to buy goods and on one of these trips shortly before his death he had his photograph made. An enlargement of this photograph has been placed in the new city hall at Hogansville, Ga., as a likeness of the founder of the town. (The new hall was built about 1934.)

Although Wm. Hogan was an extensive land and slave owner, he was as much interested in merchandising and trade as in crop-growing and he desired above all else to develop the town of Hogansville.

His daughter, Rebecca Hogan Amis, related that her father was especially kind to his negroes. He spoke "quick and to the point," but had a "ready wit and kind heart." Whenever a negro

had been ordered whipped by the overseer, the rule was made that as a last resort, the slave could secure a review of his case before the owner, Wm. Hogan. Almost without exception William ordered no whipping but some lighter punishment. His slaves adored him, although they "walked lightly" whenever near him.

William Hogan was a broad-shouldered, stocky man of much physical strength. His hair was dark brown and his eyes black and of piercing intensity. He was a dynamic personality and had succeeded largely in his many undertakings until the time of his death, which was due to pneumonia brought on from his getting wet in the hay fields in a May shower.

He died May 6, 1861. His estate was administered by his son-in-law, John Pullin, a Judge Bingham, and Judge Phillips, his friend, who soon resigned saying his opinion was outweighed. Christopher Hogan was appointed in Phillips' place, ~~but soon went into the Southern Army.~~ When Wm. Hogan died, a friend of his remarked, "The estate is so large not one child of Wm. Hogan's will ever have to work for his living as long as he lives."

"His widow, Susannah Belcher Hogan, was a handsome woman of strong character and great energy. Her greatest pleasure was in caring for the sick and suffering. As the wife of Wm. Hogan her life was closely linked with the early days of Hogansville, founded by her husband who for many years controlled practically all the business interests of the place. In 1847, he secured a Post Office and five years later, through his persistent effort, the railroad ran its line through the town; these but a few of the benefits he left to the community."

It is thought Shadrack, Sr., and Wm. Hogan, Sr., came to Ga. from N. Car. before 1800. Shadrack Hogan gave note in Mont-

gomery County, N. C., in 1785 (with his receipts). In 1799, Shadrack dec'd. in Ga.—Wm. Hogan of Lincoln County ap. admin. in 1802; petitions to sell 200A. on Clark's Creek, property of dec'd. See "Early Records of Ga." by Mrs. Grace Davidson, Pub. 1933—2 vols.

Extracted from the HURST-MONTGOMERY Family Book page 405: WILLIAM HOGAN - - Biography. This gentleman for whom Hogansville was named, was born in Lincoln Co, GA 6 Aug 1805, the son of Shadrack, II and Frankie HOGAN of Maysville, GA (Jackson Co). It is assumed that this William HOGAN, at age 23, came to Troup Co. in 1828 and settled in the lower part of the county, as one William HOGAN is recorded as the purchaser of all the land lot #83 of the 3rd land district (now part of Meriwether Co) from Samuel IHLEY on 29 Feb 1828. It is probable that he constructed a log cabin, cleared his land of trees and planted several crops before deciding to continue his search for suitable land on which to settle. The first record of William HOGAN in the 700th G.M. D., in which Hogansville is situated is where he bought one half of land lot #96 of the 11th land dist. from Henry WALSTON, SR on 15 Feb 1831. It is assumed that he came here in company with John HOGAN (probably his brother) as both names are on the record. Later that year, William HOGAN purchased all of land lot #63 and the 11th land dist. from Uriah DUNN and Wiley NEWBERRY on 3 Oct 1831. It is probable that he built a log cabin in the vicinity of the present new mill village as he settled first on that land. It is also assumed that he speculated in land as he sold all of his lot #63 to Henry WIDEMAN, 3 Nov 1835, while having bought of Thomas A. DUNN, all of the land in lot #10 of the 12th land dist. (in which the present downtown shopping dist. of Hogansville is now located) on 17 Jan 1835 and all of land lot #97 of the 11th land dist. (which included the present Main St. from about the location of the 1st Methodit Church to the eastern limits of Hogansville) from William HOPSON on 4 Mar 1835. Later on, he bought and sold other properties in this section.

In 1847, William HOGAN was the first to give the right of way for the planned Atlanta and LaGrange Railroad with the stipulation that a depot be erected on his land and this in turn encouraged other landowners to give the right of way along the planned route. At this time, the settlement became known as Hogansville in honor of William HOGAN for his success in getting the railroad company to change their route, which, incidentally, had been planned to run the shortest route. From 1831 to about 1855, William HOGAN was classed as a Planter and from then on until his death, he was classed as a merchant. It is also understood that he was also a manufacturer of buggies and wagons (a trade which the HURSTS later took up) besides being a proprietor of a gristmill and tannery. He must have been a smart man and a shrewd trader, as in 1860, he had amassed a fortune of some \$42,000.00 which was quite a large amount in those days.

He was well known around this section of the state during the 1840's and 50's. He had an enterprising attitude and a pleasing personality. I understand he was thought of as being a 'contented man', who was very considerate toward

his slaves. He was a member of the Emmaus Primitive Baptist Church for many years. The beautiful home which he built used to set back of the former Frank WOOD home (now owned by the school board and used for a teacher's home). This home was built of bricks made by Mrs. HOGAN's slaves and it burned down 18 Apr 1899, a fire starting in the garret. It was a two and one half story dwelling, and Mr. WORD occupied it at one time. There is no telling what might have been accomplished by William HOGAN had his life been extended for another twenty or even ten more years. Written by James LOVVORN of Ooletwah, TN.

Extracted from Hogan Family Association Newsletter: William HOGAN founded Hogansville, Troup Co, GA in 1828. He was described as a broadshouldered, stocky man of much physical strength, with dark brown hair and black eyes. He became an extensive importer of sugar, tea and coffee from foreign ports. He established a school in Hogansville for the children of plantation owners. This school flourished until the Civil War, when it became impossible to hire male teachers.
